## Father's Message

## **GIVING THANKS TO GOD FOR EVERYTHING**

As we enter November, 2017, the month when our nation celebrates the day which has been put aside for "giving thanks," it would perhaps be appropriate to spend a little time considering what this means for us as Orthodox Christians, and for how we live our lives.

For many centuries, Orthodox Christians have honored St. John Chrysostom as one of our greatest saints. We cherish his memory. But, it was not always so. John was critical of the hypocrisies of the wealthy and powerful, and was no respecter of persons. In fact, he made some pretty powerful enemies during his brief time as Patriarch of Constantinople. Among them was the emperor's wife, Eudoxia. Twice, he was sent into exile, where he suffered greatly. Finally, during a forced march even farther into the wilderness in 407, he collapsed and died. If he had been angry or embittered with his fate, we would certainly understand. But, that was not the case. On the contrary, he was heard to say as he died, "Glory to God for all things."

Sixteen hundred years later and thousands of miles away, another Orthodox clergyman, a priest named Protopresbyter Gregory Petrov (now recognized as a Hieromartyr), also died for his faith, this time in 1940 in the harsh conditions of a Soviet concentration camp. Among his effects was found a beautiful composition, an "Akathist of Thanksgiving," which had been central to Fr. Gregory's prayer life, and had helped him survive amidst terrible persecution and suffering. It had been composed by a contemporary, Metropolitan Tryphon Turkestanov, who used St. John Chrysostom's last words as the title: *Glory to God for All Things*.

This modern hymn of praise and thanksgiving, which has been composed according to the pattern of one of our most ancient hymn forms, the *Kontakion* (similar to the Akathist Hymn to the Theotokos we chant during Great Lent), is truly an inspired and inspiring masterpiece of Orthodox hymnography. It also has much to teach us about what it means to be thankful to God with every thought, every act, during every hour of the day. It begins by acknowledging God's power, and then it introduces the theme of the entire hymn, by offering Him thanks for all the ways He blesses us:

Incorruptible Lord, your right hand controls the whole course of human life, according to the decrees of your Providence for our salvation. We give you thanks for all your blessings, known and unknown: for our earthly life and your mercies towards us as we sing: Glory to you, O God, from age to age!

In the course of the Akathist, God is repeatedly praised for the beauty and majesty of Creation, and for the tender and intimate gifts of family and friendship. For example:

You brought me into this life as into an enchanted paradise. We have seen the sky, like a deep blue cup ringing with birds in the azure heights. We have listened to the soothing murmur of the forest and the sweet-sounding music of the waters. We have tasted fragrant fruit of fine flavor and sweet-scented honey. How pleasant is our stay with you on earth: it is a joy to be your guest. Glory to you for the trouble you take for me at all times, Glory for the people your Providence gave me to meet, Glory to you for the love of my dear ones, the faithfulness of friends, Glory to you for the gentleness of the animals which serve me, Glory to you for the light-filled moments of life, Glory to you for the radiant joy in my heart, Glory to you for the joy of living, moving and seeing, Glory to you, O God, from age to age. Metropolitan Tryphon addresses many aspects of living, and how we can see them as a gift, a blessing. For instance, service to others, and care for those who are corrupt or deranged:

When you inspire me to serve my neighbor, and make humility shine in my soul, one of your deep-piercing rays of light falls into my heart: it then becomes glowing, like iron in the furnace. I have seen your Face, mysterious and elusive. No one can put together what has crumbled into dust, but you can heal men whose conscience has become twisted; you give the soul its former beauty, which long ago it had lost without a hope of change. With you, nothing is hopeless. You are Love. You are the creator and the redeemer of all things. We praise you with this song: Alleluia!

He also addresses the centrality and importance of worship, and especially, the Holy Eucharist:

Blessed is he who will share your mystical supper in your kingdom; but even here on earth you have granted me this blessedness. How many times, with your divine hand, you offered me your Body and your Blood; while I, a great sinner, received these sacred Gifts and felt your ineffable and supernatural love.

He finishes as he began, by thanking God for blessing us in so many ways, and then he prays that we may be deemed worthy of such bountiful love, and of life everlasting in God's presence:

Life-giving and most merciful Trinity, receive our thanksgiving for all your kindnesses; make us worthy of your blessings, so that, when we have brought a profit from the talents you have entrusted to us, we may enter into the eternal joy of our Lord, singing the triumphal hymn: Alleluia!

When we consider that this hymn was first made known to the world when it was discovered in the pocket of an Orthodox priest who perished in seemingly hopeless conditions in a Soviet concentration camp, and that it had been composed by another Orthodox cleric under the communist yoke in his last year of life, we can only marvel. Our own problems, as serious as they might be, pale by comparison. They took seriously the words of the Apostle Paul, we counseled the Christians at Ephesus to "Sing and make music from your heart to the Lord, always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ."

We make it a point to give thanks to God on one day of the year. But, every day is Thanksgiving Day for us as Christ's disciples! St. Gregory Petrov, by his death, has opened up to us a door to eternal life, a life of love and gratitude towards God for all His blessings, even in the most dire circumstances. Following his example, we, too, can become "champions of gratitude," by making the Akathist of Thanksgiving a part of our daily prayer routine! A number of translations can easily be found online by searching for "Akathist of Thanksgiving" or "Glory to God for All Things." I made use of the translation that can be found on our own Archdiocese's website, goarch.org

There is so much to be thankful for, in this, God's glorious world, our home – today, and every day! Glory to God indeed, for all things!

## **IOCC** at 25: A Timeline

1992	IOCC formed in response to collapse of Soviet Union, opened Moscow office
1993	Began providing humanitarian assistance during breakup of former Yugoslavia
1994	Started food and education programs for newly formed Republic of Georgia
1997	Began humanitarian work in West Bank and Jerusalem
1999	Provided humanitarian assistance to victims of Kosovo conflict
1999	Started food and education programs for newly formed Republic of Georgia

2003 Delivered humanitarian assistance to Iraqi war victims

2005 Assisted survivors of the Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami

How did it all begin? IOCC started with the idea that Orthodox Christians of all jurisdictions and all ethnicities could come together to answer Christ's call to serve those in need. And a particularly great need inspired American Orthodox Christians to take action in the early 1990s. In response to the crisis, International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC) was formed by the Standing Conference of the Canonical Orthodox Bishops in the Americas (SCOBA), the predecessor to the modern-day Assembly, along with lay leaders Mr. Charles R. Ajalat, Mr. Andrew A. Athens, and Mr. John G. Rangos Sr. In addition, the faithful support of honorary board members Mr. George M. Marcus and the late Dr. George J. Farha, ensured IOCC's growth and continued service over the last 25 years. Their vision answered a call by members of the Orthodox Christian community here in the United States to respond to the great humanitarian needs arising in the wake of the Soviet Union's dissolution, including the revolutions in Eastern Europe and socioeconomic upheaval. The newly formed IOCC was American Orthodoxy's answer to this growing need and, over time, to many other needs as well. The organization's first initiative was two airlifts in February 1992: US military cargo planes flew from Pittsburgh to Moscow carrying \$4.8 million of food items and essential medical supplies. This US military cargo plane, loaded with IOCC food and medical supplies, prepares to depart from Pittsburgh to Moscow. It was collaboration across jurisdictions and a central pan-Orthodox spirit that would continue to drive IOCC's identity and success in the coming years. From that first initiative, IOCC went on to open a field office in Moscow and today has 11 field offices around the world. Through your support, IOCC has gradually expanded to reach over 60 countries with life-saving assistance, distributing more than \$600 million in humanitarian relief. As we move into the next 25 years and beyond, IOCC continues to represent the unity of the Church not only in the United States but also around the world, and through your generosity it continues to answer Christ's call to serve the least of our brethren.

You are cordially invited! Come and learn Byzantine chant from a world-class instructor, or join our choir and learn to sing the unique and beautiful arrangements composed by our founding choir director!

Our Cathedral is graced by two music ministries grounded in tradition that we hope you will consider participating in:
The first is rooted at the Analogion (the Chanter Bookstand). Our Analogion Ministry, blessed by the volunteer service of
Dr. Nick Giannoukakis, invites and welcomes anyone with some musical ability, especially the younger generation, to join and learn the
beautiful and 1200 year-old tradition of Byzantine hymnology and chant. Those who faithfully adhere to the ministry will not only have an
opportunity to grow musically, but more importantly, will solidify their understanding of Greek, gain an appreciation for the structure of
the services, and a better insight into our Orthodox faith and its theology through a comprehension of the hymns. With the exception of
the summer months (June-August), the Ministry will focus on the Sunday Orthros and the occasional Vespers, in addition to the evening
services of Lent and Holy Week. Between June and early September, the Ministry will also focus on the Holy and Divine Liturgy.

Dr. Giannoukakis, who was distinguished and tonsured as Protopsaltis by Metropolitan Maximos in 1998, and noted to be among the "who is who" of Byzantine Chanters in a historical compendium published in Greece in 1994, is also the only chanter in our Metropolis to hold a certificate and diploma in Byzantine Music from a Greek Music Conservatory. Dr. Giannoukakis, personally-trained by renowned and respected Greek chanters (Constantin Lagouros, Georgios Syrkas, Emmanuel Hatzimarkos), offers music to the highest possible standards of the Great Church of Christ (the Ecumenical Patriarchate) and has successfully trained young and old individuals for more than 25 years. To learn more, and to consider

All educational materials are complimentary. The second is rooted in the rich polyphonic innovations of the late Rudolph Agraphiotis who in the early 1900s, first composed the lyrical Liturgy conducted in our church to this day. Some of the choir members are among those who came together to constitute the first choir directed by Mr. Agraphiotis. Today, the choir is in the very capable hands of Mr. Steve Andrews who directs it as another of our Cathedral's volunteers. The choir can be heard during the Divine Liturgy for most of the year's Sunday services as well as at the services for Holy Thursday, Friday and Saturday.

The Choir invites and welcomes anyone with some musical ability, especially the younger generation, to join. 



#### GOYA OUTREACH/ SERVICE INITIATIVE **IOCC Hygiene Kits**

Dear Reverend Fathers, Youth Directors, GOYA Advisors, GOYA Officers and GOYAns,

Christ is in our midst! On behalf of Metropolitan Savas of Pittsburgh and the Metropolis Youth Commission, we are writing to you today for your support for all those who have been suffered hardship due to recent disasters. IOCC\*, the official humanitarian agency of the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of the United States of America, is collaborating with local Orthodox churches, ecumenical partners and others to provide relief where it is needed most. IOCC is working with Church World Service (CWS), the American Red Cross and other partners to understand and respond to immediate needs and relief gaps.

Mr. Dan Christopulos, IOCC US Country Representative and Incident Commander for Hurricane Harvey Disaster Relief, will be our keynote speaker for the GOYA Fall Retreat, November 17-19, 2017. Mr. Christopulos will speak on the theme, "The Liturgy outside the Liturgy." - 2. Secure kits in a box and download the IOCC Emergency Kits Coupon to fill out and include on the outside of each one.
- 3. It will cost about \$2-\$3 per kit to cover the cost of shipping to the warehouse.

Please plan a GOYA fundraising campaign that involves your parish to collect hygiene items listed & monetary donations between now and November 1. We will pool all of our resources at the GOYA Fall Retreat and assemble the kits as a part of the retreat program. (100% of all donations will go directly toward the kits & mailing.) Thanks in advance for encouraging your GOYAn's & your parish to participate in this worthy project.


